Either way I think that at times I have had high CO2 levels as feel very much fatigued at certain times and I think it is high Co2 causing it. I have gone home more often than note with nausea and headache. On some days it is so bad that nearly a third of my students have gone home. Our room has had an odor in it the past 3 years. We open windows year round. I have heard many, many complaints over the years that Workwell and administration has done nothing to take care of the mold problem in this school. It only stands to reason that a renovation of this magnitude would stir up all kind of nasty particles, dust, mold, etc. I did not grow up in Biddeford, but in a nearby town that would have taken care of this problem right away. I am 100% appalled at the lack of maintenance in this building. I have 2 children in this school and am concerned for their health. Just because a child does not have a reaction does not mean that their health isn't being negatively impacted. It may show up years from now.
